From the Senior Minister

Reconnect

Last year Bree Mills wrote, "I sense that for GWAC, this year (2019) has been a year of changing seasons. We have had times of incredible growth as a faith community, we have had times of rest, and although we may not like it there have been times of pruning as well. Our call is not to question or resist the pruning, but to trust The Gardener, and abide in The Vine. God the gardener knows what we need to grow and be fruitful, and I believe he has provided that for us in Phil's appointment. In the meantime, we are called to a time of waiting, a time of reflection, and seeking to abide as a community in Christ."

Well who would have thought that 12 months on we would have spent more than six months scattered as God's people while we wait to regather as the body of Christ on site at the GWAC facility? COVID-19 has changed all of our lives forever. It is going to be one of those moments (seasons) that none of us will ever forget.

At the time of writing we are still in lockdown but hopeful of an outcome that allows us as a church to begin regathering. However, with the easing of restrictions there will be some

pretty strict rules in place about how this will take place. But an even bigger challenge for us will be encouraging the existing GWAC community to regather with purpose and with our mission in mind. There is also the challenge for us to be pastorally mindful of all the people at GWAC as we regather. For me I will be keen to see everyone come back to the Sunday and Wednesday celebrations as soon as possible.

There are likely to be various reactions as to when and how people are ready to reconnect:

- Some will be fearful of reconnecting physically due to HEALTH-related reasons – not wanting to catch or spread coronavirus
- Others will have been conditioned, due to the severity of lockdown, to stay away and may not be in the right "HEADSPACE" to gather with large numbers of people with whom they have previously been comfortable.

For both of these reasons we need to be pastorally sensitive, supportive and prayerful for people with these understandable fears.



Let us hold on to the confession of our hope without wavering, since he who promised is faithful. And let us consider one another in order to provoke love and good works, not neglecting to gather together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging each other, and all the more as you see the day approaching.

Hebrews 10:23-25

There is a third group of people that may struggle to reconnect due to a HEART condition. With the interruption to our predictable lifestyles this year, there will be Christians who have got out of routine. Loss of motivation to gather for regular worship will be one of the effects. I was talking with one person recently who told me they have replaced their regular Sunday service time by an online car club zoom meeting! They occasionally catch up with 'church online' and watch the bits that suit them at some time later in the week. In situations like this we need to remind one another of the following words from the book of Hebrews:

"Let us hold on to the confession of our hope without wavering, since he who promised is faithful. And let us consider one another in order to provoke love and good works, not neglecting to gather together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging each other, and all the more as you see the day approaching."

Our challenge as a community in 2021 will be to reconnect in a meaningful way, with worship that honours God and both encourages and grows God's people. Are we up for the challenge? Absolutely we are!

- For starters, God is with us. Even in a pandemic, God has not abandoned or left us high and dry.
- Secondly, the GWAC people I have met since Barb and I commenced here in February this year are amazing and in many respects I have seen the mission of being 'a caring community making, maturing and mobilising disciples of Jesus Christ, locally and globally' being lived out despite the challenges.
- Thirdly, there is an incredible leadership team that I have been privileged to lead and serve. Every staff member is committed to serving and seeing this mission and the vision of the church lived out.

Yes, there will be changes to our staff team in the coming year, we trust that under God the right people will be raised

up to pick up from Bree Mills' outstanding ministry across the GWAC community these past nearly 10 years, as well as new staff to take up Bre Wilkinson's role as Youth and Young Adults' pastor as she steps into the developing church plant with the Monash community.

The following report presents a snapshot of the Cultural Values that makes up GWAC. Within each value you will find stories of various disciples from GWAC who share something of what God has done, in and through them, as they have sought to live as disciples in this challenging season.

2021 will be a year of **reconnection** for GWAC as we engage with one another and with the wider community. It will also be a year of establishing some new mission and ministry initiatives in the local community, and a year of seeing a refreshed facility from which the worship of God, training and equipping for and delivery of existing and new ministry takes place. It's all very exciting!

My journey with God started as a lad in the Choir at St Barnabas’ in Balwyn, and drifted away until I turned 30.

For older folk like myself and people with transport problems, God has yet again opened possibilities to study his word via Zoom.

I had always thought that what I loved most was architectural design. I dreamed of designing a master building one day. For this reason, I came to Australia from China to study architecture in 1990, and my wife followed a year after. The love of God drew us into the church, and we were both baptized in 1992. I asked God to help me become a good architect one day.

In 1993, after graduation, we migrated to Singapore in hope of better career prospects. I became very busy with work and often ignored church life. In 2001, inspired by the success of friends back in China, I went to Beijing to set up an architectural consulting firm. There, I faced many temptations while exploring business opportunities, and struggled at the crossroads.

I was uneasy, lonely and anxious. It was at this time that a Singaporean brother, who had been doing business in Beijing for many years, came into my life. He shared how God had taught him hard life lessons. He had come close to losing his sight after years of self-serving, chaotic living, but God cured his eye and restored his life when he repented and returned to church. God sent this brother to remind me not to stay away from him, and to bring me back into the church. I was then surrounded by mature Christians whose spirits of generous service to others impacted me greatly.

Matthew 6:33 became my reminder: *"Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."* Prompted by the Holy Spirit, I began to share the gospel with the locals. By serving others, my relationship with God had been renewed. I witnessed the amazing power of the gospel in others and in myself. God undoubtedly used his grace, mercy and power to turn my plans for self-fulfillment into plans for expanding his kingdom on earth.

My family moved to Melbourne ten years ago, and I continued to serve in church while working. One day, I felt that the desire to be a good architect no longer dominated my life. Having now gone through the first half of my life, I asked myself, "In this next half, am I really contented to only pursue my own goals?" In 2017, I started full-time study at the Melbourne School of Theology.

God continues to guide and empower me through his word and Spirit. Today, I am convinced that God is the master architect who planned my life from the beginning, and that I am just a brick in his hand to be placed in the master building of the Kingdom of God. Being able to serve generously is our privilege by God's grace.

The Covid pandemic followed by the lockdown took us all by surprise. The challenges of doing everyday life in the face of this pandemic brought anxiety and uncertainty to us.

We thought about how we would do life, and what it meant for us to not see our children, grandchildren, family and loved ones and miss out on the regular things in life we take for granted. Feeling this sense of loss amidst the anxiety of ensuring we stayed safe and did not expose ourselves to COVID-19 became our everyday conversations. At the beginning of 2020, Studio Seven was facing many changes. Members of our core team stepped into new ministries, and a number of newly graduated year 12s connected into our community. What started as a community seeking to unite creatives and explore creative worship, was now a community facing the unknown.

When COVID-19 hit, as many communities experienced, we were struck with a sudden inability to meet in person, with no idea of when we would reunite. Since Studio Seven is primarily connected with students and young adults, we quickly succumbed to Zoom fatigue. It was difficult to ask those studying online to commit to more hours each week on Zoom. We began to ask ourselves how this would impact our gatherings.

We turned to the early church in the book of Acts, and the core of Christian community. It was both challenging and encouraging to revisit the early church, discussing the unshaken hearts of the apostles facing struggle and persecution. Through the most difficult times, we are encouraged that our community has committed to the discipline of prayer, for the world, and for each other. Many of us have especially struggled with our mental health, but have also been blessed to bear witness to God's healing power through each others prayers and encouragement.

Our migration to Zoom also meant that we couldn't paint, sing, or create together as easily as before. We doubted the role of creativity and art in our community, since we could no longer provide the same accessibility to creative resources.

Despite uncertainty and Zoom fatigue, we continued to meet. Two young adults from our community volunteered to run creative workshops, sharing their skills in creative writing and music production with us. Through these workshops, God provided spaces for us to be vulnerable with each other, to share our passions and gifts with one another, as well as to work together on creative and collaborative projects. As our leadership struggled with finding ways to make creative worship accessible, God reminded us that it wasn't our responsibility to make the community 'work', but to trust that He is at work beyond our own capacity.

In an isolated time, God continues to remind us that we are connected through Him. We give thanks for His provision of technology and a well-needed space for us to regularly spend time in fellowship through this difficult season.

My involvement at GWAC involves attending the 8am service, assisting with some of the roles at 8am, including money counting and being a steward, and volunteering one morning a week in the GWAC office.

Ten years ago, Gail attended the local volunteer recruitment agency now called South East Volunteers and was referred to Monash Waverley Community Information & Support (MWCIS) who were calling for volunteers. Gail expressed an interest, and I attended an information interview with her. I was impressed with

the organisation and decided to volunteer as well. We completed the required accredited course to equip us for the role. I am now the President and have been for seven years.

MWCIS provides emergency relief to local residents who are in need of assistance, including food parcels, supermarket vouchers and referrals to other support services for assistance. Volunteers offer a listening ear for those who attend. We have no paid staff, we are all volunteers.

The COVID 19 restrictions have affected the operations of MWCIS greatly. As an essential service, we are still open to assist those in need, however on a reduced basis. We normally operate 30 hours a week, but this has been reduced to 9 hours a week.

GWAC members have supported MWCIS faithfully. The grocery trolley in the fellowship area is well patronised and this is a great help. Please continue your support once we can meet again.

My reason for volunteering was due to the desire to do something for others in my retirement. I was greatly assisted by the pastoral care course at GWAC a few years ago as it helped me to help clients, and also fellow volunteers when they faced personal problems. I can see God's help in the work I undertake in providing emergency relief and working administratively in this role. I enjoy meeting people from all walks of life and I am grateful for the opportunity to share God's love in a quiet way.

The gospel compels us to be radical in our generosity and compassionate in how we respond to all those we encounter.

It has been a real privilege to be given the opportunity to work with the Project Team, Staff and Governance Board on the exciting refurbishment project. The silver lining of this tiresome pandemic is that it is the ideal chance to manage a lot of work while the building is empty.

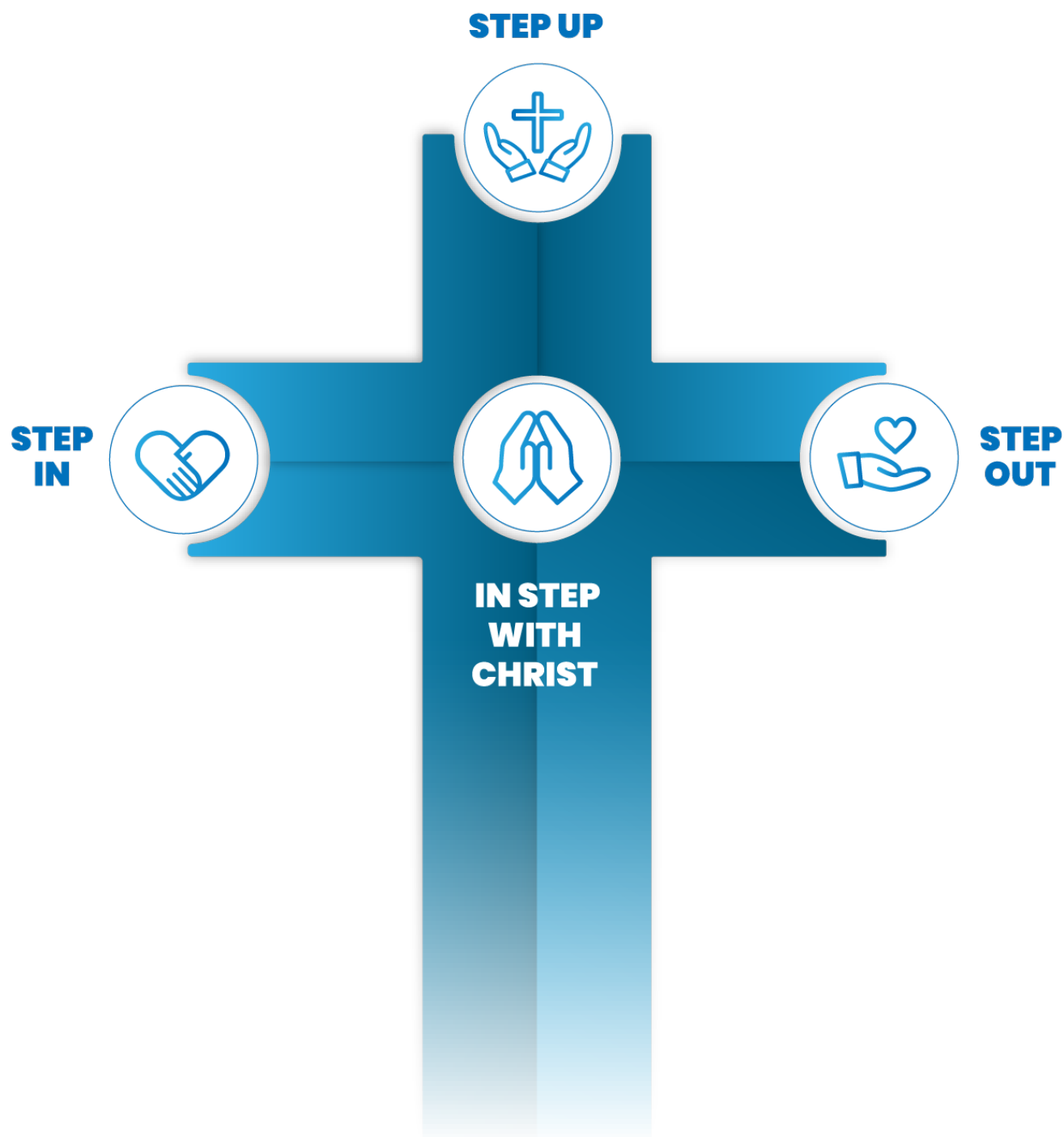

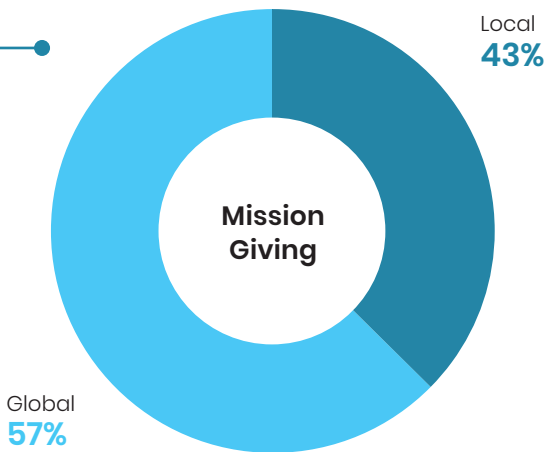

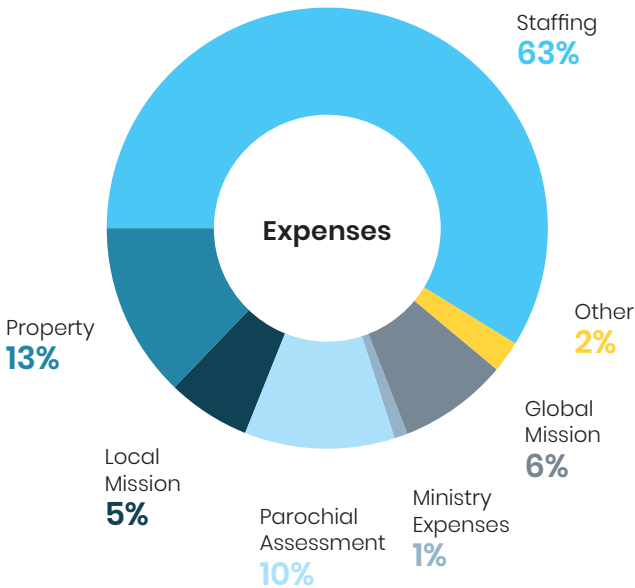
